Professional Love in Early Years Settings

Many children spend a significant amount of time in the care of practitioners in a range of early years settings, where it is as important that they establish attachment relationships with their caregivers as it is with their parents. In fact, early years practitioners can provide babies who do not have a secure attachment with their primary caregiver[s], the opportunity to develop a close, emotional and trusting relationship.

The research of Dr Jools Page showed that many early years professionals are anxious about showing affection toward the children in their care, and that one in five practitioners said they avoided being alone with a child (Page and Elfer 2013).

But Jools believes that "close, intimate and trusting relationships" are essential for infants, toddlers and young children: and that In the context of education and care this is professional' love.

But what does Professional Love involve?
